


The Gospel Goes Forth Matthew 28:18–20 (LSB)

- Known as the "father of modern missions"
- Helped found the
- Was deeply impacted by Jonathan Edwards' Account of the Life of the Late Rev. David Brainerd
- Left for India in 1793
- In 1801, he became a professor of Bengali at the College of Fort William in Calcutta
- Established a printing press to make copies of the New Testament in Bengali
- In 1818, established a training school for pastors
- Died on June 9, 1834, having devoted his life to the advancement of the gospel in India

Adoniram Judson (1788-1850)

- Born in _____ just 12 years after the United States gained independence from Britain
- Married his wife, Ann, on February 5, 1812
- Set sail for India two weeks later
- Lost their financial backing few months after leaving
- Problems with their visas in India forced them to settle in Burma
- After 12 years of work, Judson and his fellow missionaries saw only 18 conversions
- Faced constant threats from illness, disease, and the government
- Suspected of being a spy, he was sent to a death prison where he was tortured and forced on a death march that nearly killed him.
- In all he spent 17 months in prison while his wife did everything she could to secure his release
- Shortly after his release, his wife Ann died

- From 1812-1850, Judson buried 24 of his relatives and close associates including several of his children
- He continued to pursue his goal of bringing the gospel to the Burmese people
- When he died:
- He had completed the translation of the Bible
- 100 churches had been planted
- More than 8,000 Burmese people professed faith in the Lord Jesus
- Nearly 150 years after his death, in 1993, the head of the Myanmar Evangelical Fellowship stated,
- "Today, there are 6 million Christians in Myanmar, and every one of us trace our spiritual heritage to one man the Reverend Adoniram Judson."

C. T. Studd (1860-1931)

- Born December 2, 1860 into a wealthy family
- Came to faith in Christ at age 16 through the influence of D. L. Moody
- Went to Cambridge where he became one of the most well-known cricket players in the world
- After leaving Cambridge he realized he did not want to pursue a career in athletics
- He left England to serve as a missionary in China under the oversight of Hudson Taylor
- He spent a decade in China spending much of his time working in an opium addiction rehabilitation center
- After returning to England for a few years, he moved his family to India and pastored a local church for 7 years
- Eventually he became convinced that God wanted him to bring the gospel to the interiors of Africa
- He reached the Belgian Congo in 1913
- Faced many difficulties including contracting a severe case of malaria

- On one occasion he awoke to discover a venomous snake had been sleeping by his side all night long
- Along with fellow missionaries, he helped establish a number of missionary stations in the heart of Died in Africa at the age of 70
- Spent his entire adult life in missionary service:

The dangers incident to missions ought not to keep any true man back, even if they were very great, but they are now reduced to a minimum. There are hundreds of places where the cross of Christ is unknown, to which we can go without risk. Who will go?"
